Climate and Time zone in Australian Capital Territory



The ACT observes daylight saving time from the first Sunday in October to the first Sunday in April. During this period, clocks are moved forward one hour, making the time GMT+11:00.



The ACT experiences a temperate climate with four distinct seasons. Summer (December to February) is warm to hot, with temperatures often reaching the mid-30°C. The region sees a fair amount of sunshine, making it perfect for outdoor activities. Autumn (March to May) is marked by mild and stable weather, with temperatures gradually cooling down. Winter (June to August) can be quite chilly, with average daytime temperatures around 11°C and nighttime temperatures often dropping below freezing. Frosty mornings and occasional snowfall in the nearby mountains are common. Spring (September to November) brings a burst of colour with blooming flowers and rising temperatures.

Dates to remember

New Year's Day: Celebrates the first day of the Gregorian calendar.

Australia Day: the day of arrival of the first British fleet in Australia, and is marked on January 26.

Canberra Day: Celebrates the official naming of Canberra and it is held on the second Monday in March.

Easter: There are four public holidays days each year held to celebrate Easter: Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Sunday and Easter Monday.

Anzac Day: A national day of commemoration that honors the sacrifice of Australian and New Zealand soldiers in all wars, and is celebrated on April 25.

King's Birthday: Celebrates the birthday of the monarch, with various events and ceremonies.

Labour Day: Recognises the contribution of the workers and it is celebrated on the first Monday of October.

Christmas: celebrates the birth of Jesus Christ which often includes family gathering, gift-giving and meals. Public holidays usually include Christmas Day (25th of December) and Boxing Day (26th of December).
