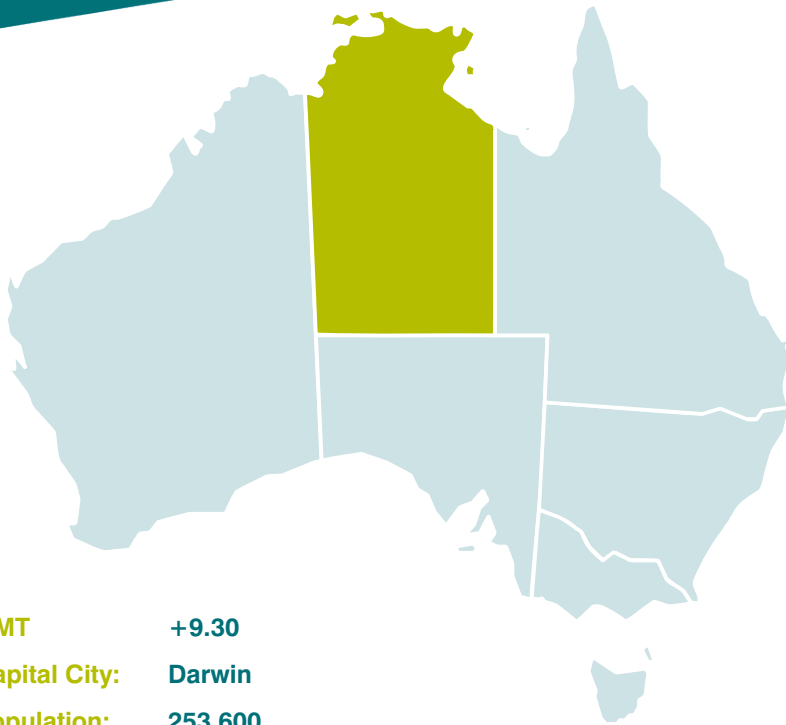

## Climate and Time zone in Northern Territory



The Northern Territory operates on Australian Central Standard Time (ACST), which is GMT +9:30. Unlike some parts of Australia, the NT does not observe Daylight Saving Time, so the time remains consistent throughout the year.



The Northern Territory experiences two main climatic regions. In the northern part, known as the Top End, the climate is tropical. From November to April, the wet season brings hot and humid weather with heavy monsoonal rains and thunderstorms, with temperatures typically ranging from 25°C to 33°C. During the dry season, which lasts from May to October, the weather is warm and dry with clear skies, and temperatures range from 17°C to 30°C. In the southern region, often referred to as the Red Centre, the climate is semi-arid to arid. Summer, from December to February, is extremely hot, with daytime temperatures soaring above 40°C and cooling off significantly at night. Winter, from June to August, brings mild days and quite cold nights, often dropping below 0°C, with daytime temperatures ranging from 20°C to 25°C.

## Dates to remember

**New Year's Day:** Celebrates the first day of the Gregorian calendar.

**Australia Day:** the day of arrival of the first British fleet in Australia, and is marked on January 26.

**Easter:** There are four public holidays days each year held to celebrate Easter: Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Sunday and Easter Monday.

**Anzac Day:** A national day of commemoration that honors the sacrifice of Australian and New Zealand soldiers in all wars, and is celebrated on April 25.

**Labour Day:** Recognises the contribution of the workers and it is celebrated on the first Monday of October.

**King's Birthday:** Celebrates the birthday of the monarch, with various events and ceremonies.

**Picnic Day:** A day dedicated for outdoor activities and relaxation, it is held on the first Monday of August.

**Christmas:** celebrates the birth of Jesus Christ which often includes family gathering, gift-giving and meals. Public holidays usually include Christmas Day (25th of December) and Boxing Day (26th of December).

### Metropolitan Area

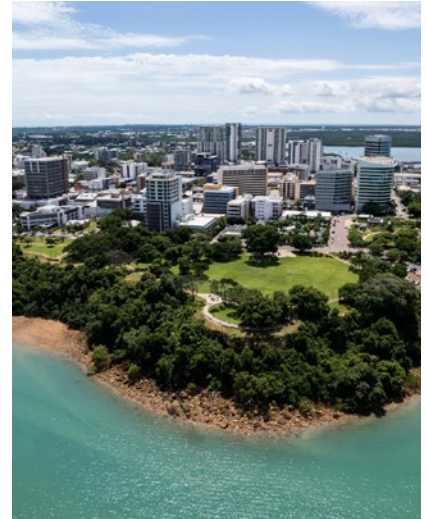

The annual Alice Springs Desert Festival and the Camel Cup are highlights of the social calendar, celebrating the unique culture and community spirit of the region.
