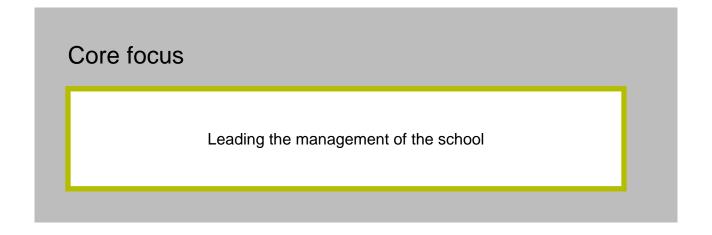


Interactive Leadership Profiles
